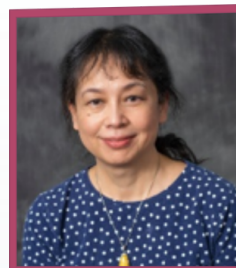

Celebrating Twenty-Five Years of the Belmont Humanities Symposium

TWENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO, WHEN THE THEN DEPARTMENT OF LITERATURE AND LANGUAGE AND THE DEPARTMENT OF PHILOSOPHY DECIDED TO ORGANIZE “MURDER IN THE MANSION,” WE CALLED IT A SYMPOSIUM BECAUSE WE WANTED TO EMPHASIZE AN ASPECT OF ACADEMIC ENGAGEMENT FUNDAMENTAL TO OUR DISCIPLINES, THE FOCUS ON CONVERSATION. TODAY, AS SOCIAL MEDIA, TWENTY-FOUR HOUR NEWS CYCLES, AI, AND POLITICAL DIVISION SEEM TO THREATEN OUR ABILITY TO INTERACT DEEPLY AND MEANINGFULLY WITH EACH OTHER, EVEN WITH THOSE WE MAY NOT AGREE WITH, THAT RECIPROCAL, CONVERSATION-BASED FORMAT, THAT REQUIRES BOTH LISTENING AND SPEAKING, SEEMS ALL THE MORE IMPORTANT. PERHAPS WE SHOULDN’T BE SURPRISED, THEN, TO DISCOVER THAT THE ORIGINAL, ROOT SENSE OF CONVERSATION ISN’T ABOUT TALKING WITH EACH OTHER AT ALL: IT’S ABOUT LIVING WITH OTHERS, OPENING UP TO THE POSSIBILITY OF TURNING OURSELVES ABOUT AS WE ENCOUNTER OTHERS, AND IN THAT WAY ALLOWING OURSELVES TO CELEBRATE EVERYTHING OUR COMMON HUMANITY HAS TO OFFER. SO, THIS YEAR, INSTEAD OF ENGAGING WITH ONE FOCUSED SUBJECT FROM MANY ANGLES, DURING THE FIVE DAYS OF OUR 25TH SYMPOSIUM WE WILL RESUME CONVERSATIONS ON THE FIVE TOPIC GROUPINGS REPRESENTING THE PAST TWENTY-FIVE YEARS: OUR ENCOUNTERS AND CONVERSATIONS; OUR COMPARATIVE IMPULSES; OUR CONTEXTS; OUR TECHNOLOGIES; OUR NARRATIVES AND LANGUAGES.

JASON LOVVORN, PROFESSOR DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH, BELMONT UNIVERSITY SINCE 2002, THE BELMONT UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF HUMANITIES HAS CELEBRATED THE SPECIAL STATUS OF HUMANKIND WITH LECTURES, PRESENTATIONS, WORKSHOPS, FILMS, SERVICE EVENTS, AND AWARDS. ACROSS THIS LONGSTANDING SYMPOSIUM SERIES, INNATE CURIOSITY ABOUT THE WORLD AROUND US, AS WELL AS HUMANITY'S PLACE IN IT, HAVE BEEN STAPLE OFFERINGS TO THE BELMONT COMMUNITY. THIS TALK, WHICH SERVES AS THIS YEAR'S MONTEVERDE LECTURE, WILL EXPLORE THE BREADTH AND DEPTH OF THE BELMONT HUMANITIES SYMPOSIUM WHILE PRESSING ON THE VALUE OF SYMPOSIA IN GENERAL AND EXPLORING THE DEEPLY CURIOUS NATURE CONNECTED TO OUR SYMPOSIUM'S SUCCESS. 12:00	"PRESERVING THE PAST OF THE SYMPOSIUM FOR THE FUTURE" PANEL DISCUSSION WITH LIBRARY STAFF AND OTHERS THIS FOLLOW UP TO THE PRESENTATION IN THE PREVIOUS HOUR WILL EXPLORE MORE FULLY WAYS THE HUMANITIES SYMPOSIUM IS BEING REMEMBERED THROUGH THE NEW LIBRARY ARCHIVE, WHICH ALSO INCLUDES SEVERAL YEARS OF THE JOURNAL PRODUCED BY STUDENTS UNDER FACULTY GUIDANCE, PAST PROGRAMS, AND FOR THE COVID YEARS RECORDED LECTURES. SPEAKERS WILL INCLUDE MEMBERS OF THE LIBRARY STAFF, THE EDITOR OF THE JOURNAL, AS WELL AS SEVERAL FACULTY AND STUDENTS INVOLVED WITH THE ARRANGING AND PARTICIPATING IN HUMANITIES SYMPOSIA PAST AND PRESENT. 1:00	"SCIENCE IS A CONVERSATION" SCIENCE FACULTY PANEL MODERATED BY DR. KRISTA MCBRIDE, PHYSICS, BELMONT UNIVERSITY IN THIS FIRST OF TWO PANELS BY BELMONT SCIENCE FACULTY, DR. RYAN FOX (MATHEMATICS), DUSTIN KELLER (PSYCHOLOGY), AZUAH DAHMEN (BIOLOGY), JEFF GUSTOFSON (CHEMISTRY) AND DAVON FERRERA (PHYSICS) WILL DISCUSS A FUNDAMENTAL BUT OFTEN OVERLOOKED ASPECT OF SCIENCE, ONE THAT RELATES IT TO THE MOST HUMAN OF ALL ACTIVITIES: CONVERSATION. SCIENCE IS OFTEN PRESENTED AS A COLLECTION OF FACTS AND ANSWERS, BUT AT HEART, SCIENCE IS A CONVERSATION, A CONTINUAL EXCHANGE OF QUESTIONS, EVIDENCE, IDEAS, AND PERSPECTIVES. LIKE ALL MEANINGFUL CONVERSATIONS, SCIENTIFIC INQUIRY REQUIRES US TO LISTEN CAREFULLY, CHALLENGE OUR ASSUMPTIONS, AND RECOGNIZE THAT BEING WRONG IS NOT FAILURE BUT INFORMATION, INVITING US TO RECONSIDER WHAT WE THINK WE KNOW. THIS PANEL EXPLORES HOW MATHEMATICS AND SCIENCE MODEL A SHARED PURSUIT OF UNDERSTANDING, AND ASKS WHAT WE MIGHT LEARN FROM BRINGING THAT SAME OPENNESS, CURIOSITY, AND WILLINGNESS TO BE CHANGED INTO OUR EVERYDAY CONVERSATIONS. THE GOOD NEWS IS THAT WE CAN UNCOVER SOME OF THE WEIRD, SURPRISING, AND INSIGHTFUL BELIEFS THESE WOMEN HELD BY LOOKING CLOSELY AT AN UNLIKELY SOURCE: ANCIENT GYNECOLOGY.
